Pediatric Nursing/Mental Health Shortages



in quarterly turnover rate among registered nurses in children's hospitals (2019 – 2021). In addition, pediatric nurses, other children's hospital bedside staff reducing hours; many leaving health care completely.



only 5.4 clinical child and adolescent psychologists per 100,000 children <18 years of age. There are also shortages in other pediatric mental health specialties critical to improving early identification and intervention.



Dire shortage of diverse children's mental health providers - an added burden on racial and ethnic minority communities who already face inequitable access to care.

2023 Survey – Children's Hospitals' Workforce Shortages

Subspecialty Shortages:



Have shortages of pediatric neurologists.

Average Wait Time:

5 weeks to >2 months



Face shortages in developmental-behavioral pediatrics, genetics, pediatric pulmonology, adolescent medicine, child and adolescent psychiatry.

Non-physician Shortages:



Report moderate, major or severe shortages of respiratory therapists.



Report moderate, major or severe shortages of:

- Imaging, surgical and medical techs
- RNs, CNAs, and CRNAs
- Mental health providers

About Nurse Corps

The Nurse Corps offers programs to help address shortages of nurses across the country. These include:

- loan repayment to nurses who work in facilities experiencing a critical shortage of nurses;
- loan repayment to nurse faculty; and
- scholarships to students enrolled—or accepted for enrollment—in nursing degree programs.

Nurse Corps Loan Repayment Program

The Nurse Corps offers loan repayment to nurses who work in health care facilities experiencing a critical shortage of nurses; and to nurse faculty who teach full-time in eligible public or private schools of nursing.

- The program will award 60% of unpaid nursing student loans in exchange for two years of service.
- For an additional third year of service, the program will award an additional 25% of the original balance.




2-Year minimum With an optional 3rd year

Nurse Corps Program Site Points of Contact Expectations



Nurse Corps Sites must have at least one Point of Contact to complete in a timely manner online:

- An Employment Verification Form during the application cycle
- In-Service Verification Form every six months of service

- Check if site is already listed; otherwise create a site profile
- Create an inquiry OR click on Site Eligibility Verification Request

Nurse Corps staff will verify

- If the site is a public or private health care facility located in, designated as, or serving a primary medical care or mental health, Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA)
- If the site is an eligible health facility type as listed in the Application and Program Guidance (APG)



Faculty Loan Repayment Program (FLRP)

Loan payment assistance up to \$40,000 for health professional school faculty

 Provide tax assistance by providing an additional 39% of their award amount for tax purposes (sent directly to the IRS not the individual)

Eligibility:

- Come from a disadvantaged background, based on environmental and/or economic factors,
- Have an eligible health professions degree or certificate, and
- Have an employment commitment as a faculty member at an approved health professions institution for a minimum of two years.



Behavioral Health Workforce
Education and Training
(BHWET) - Program for
Professionals

BHWET - Professionals - Increases the supply of behavioral health professionals, improving distribution of a quality behavioral health workforce.

BHWET - CAY — Increases the number of behavioral health providers prepared to address the needs of children, adolescents, and transitional aged youth in high need and high demand areas

Graduate Psychology Education (GPE) Program

GPE - Prepares doctoral health service psychology students, interns, and post-doctoral residents to provide integrated behavioral health to rural and underserved populations.

What is the Pediatric Specialty Loan Repayment Program (LRP)?

- HRSA seeks eligible disciplines in delivering pediatric specialty care,
 child and adolescent care in a Pediatric Specialty LRP-approved site.
- A new loan repayment program authorized by SEC. 775 of the PHS Act (42 USC 295f).
- Program Purpose
 - Recruit and retain pediatric medical subspecialist, pediatric surgical specialist, or child and adolescent behavioral health care providers located in a HPSA, MUA or serving a MUP.





Benefits of the Pediatric Specialty LRP

How does the PSLRP benefit clinicians?

- PSLRP helps to remove financial barriers for primary care clinicians, enabling them to provide care in high-need areas.
- Providers receive loan repayment in addition to a competitive salary from their employers.

Fiscal Year 2023

- Received approximately 1,467 applications
- Awarded 122 clinicians







Basic Eligibility for the Pediatric Specialty LRP



U.S. citizen, national or lawful permanent resident



Currently work at a PS LRPapproved facility



Have unpaid government or commercial loans for school tuition.



Licensed, certified or credentialed to practice in state were employer site is located or is entering or receiving training in an accredited pediatric medical subspecialty or pediatric surgical specialty residency or fellowship, by application close date.





Basic Eligibility for the Pediatric Specialty LRP (cont.)

Must be licensed, certified or credentialed in one of the following eligible disciplines

- Physician (MD or DO)
- Psychologists
- Licensed clinical social workers
- Licensed or Certified Master's Level Social Workers
- Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioners
- Licensed professional counselors
- Marriage and family therapists
- Substance Use Disorder Counselors

Conduct innovative and valuable pediatric research






Children's Hospitals Graduate Medical Education Payment Program

59 freestanding children's teaching hospitals




29 states + DC, Puerto Rico

CHGME Eligibility

- Approved Graduate Medical Education (GME) program
- Medicare Provider Agreement
- Excluded from the Medicare Inpatient Prospective Payment System (IPPS)
- Operates as a freestanding children's teaching hospital



Primary Care Training and Enhancement (PCTE) Program

- Overall Goal: The Primary Care Training and Enhancement (PCTE) Program aims to strengthen the primary care workforce by supporting enhanced training for future primary care clinicians, teachers, and researchers in rural and underserved areas.
- Annual Appropriation: \$49,924,000
 - 15% must go toward physician assistant programs
 - FY 2023 received additional \$60,000,000 from Bipartisan Safer Communities Act
- Programs: 10 programs under the PCTE umbrella.
- Period of Performance: 5 years



PCTE Programs Eligible for Children's Hospital Program

- Eligibility Criteria:
 - Must be a primary care residency program
 - Freestanding children's hospital
 - Participate in an approved Graduate Medical Education Program
 - Have a Medicare provider agreement.
- Current programs that would be eligible include:
 - PCTE Language and Disability Access
 - PCTE Residency Training in Mental and Behavioral Health
 - PCTE Residency Training in Primary Care
- No open grant opportunities for PCTE in FY 2024 for primary care residency programs.
